### AN ORDINANCE 2009-05-14-0386

AUTHORIZING A FUNDING AGREEMENT WITH THE MAIN PLAZA CONSERVANCY FOR DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION OF SHADE STRUCTURES IN MAIN PLAZA AND APPROVING \$90,000.00 IN MATCHING FUNDS TO THE CONSERVANCY'S PRIVATELY-RAISED \$250,000.00.

WHEREAS, the Main Plaza is a historic public plaza and park dedicated with the founding of the City of San Antonio; and

WHEREAS, the City of San Antonio, in partnership with Bexar County, has redeveloped Main Plaza through capital improvements which include improved drainage, pedestrian accessibility, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility and reinforcement of the historical nature of the Plaza; and

WHEREAS, the Main Plaza is a City-owned park operated by the Main Plaza Conservancy under a Management Agreement authorized by City Council on January 17, 2008 and executed on February 20, 2008; and

WHEREAS, under the Management Agreement, the Main Plaza Conservancy is authorized to manage Main Plaza providing special events programming, concessions and daily grounds maintenance for a five-year term ending March 30, 2013; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance will authorize a Funding Agreement with the Main Plaza Conservancy for the expenditure of an amount not to exceed \$90,000.00 for the design and construction of shade structures in Main Plaza; and

WHEREAS, in order to address the need for additional shade in the Main Plaza, the Conservancy has raised funds in the amount of \$250,000.00 for this project, and is going to undertake the work on behalf of the City; and

WHEREAS, the construction of this project is anticipated to be completed within one year of the execution of the funding agreement, if authorized by this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, these funds were allocated by City Councilwoman Mary Alice Cisneros in the \$2.5 million portion of the \$30 million amendment to the Six-Year Capital Improvements Plan and 5-Year Infrastructure Management Program; NOW THEREFORE:

### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:

**SECTION 1.** The City Manager or her designee, or the Director of the Parks and Recreation or his designee is authorized to execute a funding agreement with the Main Plaza Conservancy for design and construction of shade structures in Main Plaza and approving \$90,000.00 in matching funds to the Conservancy's privately-raised \$250,000.00. A copy of the funding agreement in substantially final form is attached hereto and incorporated herein for all purposes as **Attachment I**.

**SECTION 2.** The budget in SAP Fund 43099000, Certificates of Obligation Capital Projects, SAP Project Definition 40-00999, Main Plaza, shall be revised by decreasing SAP WBS Element 40-00999-05-02 entitled Construction, SAP GL account 5201140, by the amount of \$50,000.00.

**SECTION 3.** The budget in SAP Fund 43099000, Certificates of Obligation Capital Projects, SAP Project Definition 40-00999, Main Plaza, shall be revised by increasing SAP WBS Element 40-00999-05-02-01 entitled City Construction, SAP GL account 5201140, by the amount of \$50,000.00.

**SECTION 4.** The amount of \$40,000.00 is appropriated in SAP Fund 43904029, 2009 Tax Notes, SAP WBS TN-20094-01-01-08, SAP GL account 6102100 – Interfund Transfer out entitled Transfer to 19-00011-90-01. The amount of \$40,000.00 is authorized to be transferred to SAP Fund 43099000, Certificates of Obligation Capital Projects.

**SECTION 5.** The budget in SAP Fund 43099000, Certificates of Obligation Capital Projects, SAP Project Definition 19-00011, Main Plaza, shall be revised by increasing SAP WBS element 19-00011-90-01 entitled Transfer From TN-20094-01-01-08, SAP GL account 6101100 – Interfund Transfer In, by the amount of \$40,000.00.

**SECTION 6.** The amount of \$40,000.00 is appropriated in SAP Fund 43099000, Certificates of Obligation Capital Projects, SAP Project Definition 19-00011, Main Plaza, SAP WBS 19-00011-05-08, SAP GL account 5201140 entitled \$30 Million (Tax Notes).

**SECTION 7.** This ordinance authorizes a funding agreement with the Main Plaza Conservancy in the amount up to \$90,000.00 from SAP Fund 43099000, Certificates of Obligation Capital Projects, SAP Project Definitions 40-00999, Main Plaza, and 19-00011, Main Plaza and payment is authorized to be encumbered and made payable to Main Plaza Conservancy for design and construction costs.

**SECTION 8.** The financial allocations in this Ordinance are subject to approval by the Director of Finance, City of San Antonio. The Director of Finance may, subject to concurrence by the City Manager or the City Manager's designee, correct allocations to specific SAP Fund Numbers, SAP Project Definitions, SAP WBS Elements, SAP Internal Orders, SAP Fund Centers, SAP Cost Centers, SAP Functional Areas, SAP Funds Reservation Document Numbers, and SAP GL Accounts as necessary to carry out the purpose of this Ordinance.

**SECTION 9.** This ordinance shall be effective on and after May 24, 2009.

FUNDING AGREEMENT

**Background:** Grantee manages Main Plaza, a City owned public park under a Management Agreement executed the 20<sup>th</sup> day of February 2007. Grantee and City, in order to address a need for more shade in Main Plaza and have agreed on working together towards the installation of shade structures in Main Plaza (the "Project"), as approved by the Historic and Design Review Commission (HDRC). Grantee has raised \$250,000 in funds for this Project and is going to undertake the work on behalf of the City. The purpose of this agreement is to authorize the transfer of City funds to Grantee in support of the Project.

NOW THEREFORE, the Parties hereto severally and collectively agree, and by the execution hereof are bound, to the mutual obligations herein contained and to the performance and accomplishment of the tasks hereinafter described.

### I. TERM

1.01 The term of this Agreement shall commence upon execution of the Agreement by the City Manager or designee and continue until completion of the Project.

### II. GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES OF GRANTEE

- 2.01 Provided Grantee receives the funding described in this Agreement, Grantee hereby accepts full responsibility for the performance of all services and activities described in this Agreement to complete the construction of the Project by one year from final execution of this agreement.
- 2.02 Current budget estimates of the Project are \$350,000 of the City's contribution shall not exceed \$100,000. Grantee shall provide all necessary funding for the Project beyond the City's commitment contained herein and provide evidence to City that all Project funds have been secured. In the event the scope of the project is adjusted downward resulting in a decreased cost of the project, the City shall have the option of adjusting its commitment downward accordingly to ensure that the City's funding does not exceed 50% of the total cost of the project.

- 2.03 Unless written notification by Grantee to the contrary is received and approved by City, Grantee's executive director shall be Grantee designated representative responsible for the management of this Agreement.
- 2.04 The Director of the Capital Improvements Management Services ("CIMS") or his designee shall be responsible for the administration of this Agreement on behalf of City until the completion of the Project.
- 2.05 Communications between City and Grantee shall be directed to the designated representatives of each as set forth in paragraphs numbered 2.03 and 2.04 hereinabove.
- 2.06 Grantee shall provide to City their plans and specifications for the Project ("Plans") and such Plans shall be subject to the review and approval of City, acting in its capacity as grantor under this Agreement. After approval by City, Grantee shall not make any substantial changes to the Plans without the prior written approval of City. The approvals given in this Section do not relieve Grantee of the burden of obtaining all necessary governmental approvals, including those provided by City through its relevant development departments and relevant boards and commissions including the Historic and Design Review Commission, and the State of Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (Article 9102).
- 2.07 Grantee shall submit all future changes to the CIMS Director or his designee for review and approval to ensure their compatibility with the Plans.
- 2.08 City shall have authority to inspect the Project throughout the construction process to ensure compliance with the Plans. Grantee shall cause its design professional to provide periodic certifications of construction certifying that construction has been conducted in compliance with the Plans. Grantee shall submit said certification to the CIMS Director or his designee at the completion of the Project construction. City shall have the right to withhold funding until such certifications are provided.

### III. COMPLIANCE WITH FEDERAL, STATE AND LOCAL LAWS

- 3.01 Grantee warrants and represents that it will comply with all Federal, State and Local laws and regulations and will use all reasonable efforts to ensure said compliance by any and all contractors and subcontractors that may work on the Project.
- 3.02 Grantee shall utilize an objective competitive solicitation process for selection of any needed contractors paid for, in whole or in part, with City funds.
- 3.03 Grantee shall comply with Government Code provisions regarding performance and payment bonds on certain Public Works contracts (copies of required bonds must be provided to City prior to the start of construction).
- 3.04 Grantee shall comply with Government Code chapter 2258 and Ordinance No. 71312 regarding Prevailing Wage Rate regulations required for certain Public Works Contracts, including ensuring that is construction contractor submit certified payrolls to the City on a weekly basis utilizing the form required by the Wage and Hour office of CIMS.

3.05 Grantee's Plans must conform to Americans with Disabilities Act requirements and must be approved by the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation before construction may begin. Inspections and final approval shall be the responsibility of Grantee.

### IV. OWNERSHIP, USE OPERATIONS

4.01 Grantee hereby acknowledges that the Project improvements shall become the property of the City upon completion of the project. Grantee shall file any warranty claims for any defects in the material or workmanship in the Project and shall, at the City's option, assign such contractual rights to City.

### V. FUNDING AND ASSISTANCE BY CITY

- 5.01 City shall reimburse Grantee for all eligible expenses incurred hereunder. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Agreement, the total of all payments and other obligations made or incurred by City hereunder shall not exceed the sum of \$100,000.00.
- 5.02 City shall not be obligated nor liable under this Agreement to any party, other than Grantee, for payment of any monies or provision of any goods or services.

### VI. RECEIPT, DISBURSEMENT AND ACCOUNT OF FUNDS BY GRANTEE

- 6.01 Grantee agrees to maintain readily identifiable records that will provide accurate, current, separate, and complete disclosure of the status of any funds received pursuant to this Agreement. Grantee further agrees:
  - (A) That maintenance of said records shall be in compliance with all terms, provisions, and requirements of this Agreement and with all generally accepted accounting practices; and
  - (B) That Grantee's record system shall contain sufficient documentation to provide, in detail, full support and justification for each expenditure.
- 6.02 Grantee agrees to retain all books, records, documents, reports, written accounting policies and procedures and all other relevant materials (hereinafter "records") pertaining to activities pertinent to this Agreement for a minimum of four (4) years from the completion of the Projects. Records will be retained by Grantee in an electronic format and Grantee will forward the records to City at the end of the four year period.
- 6.03 In order to be reimbursed for work completed, Grantee shall submit to the City a report (in substantially the same form as Attachment I) indicating the amount of funds expended, the payee, the date paid, the purpose of the payment, and provide supporting documentation (i.e.

copies of paid itemized invoices) as requested by the City. Prior to reimbursement, City will have the right to inspect work completed to ensure conformance with the approved Plans.

- 6.04 All requests for reimbursement shall be submitted through the City's Program Management Portal ("Portal"). Grantee shall sign a Business Level Agreement and ensure that all of its employees or representatives utilizing the Portal sign and comply with an Individual User Agreement. Such requests for reimbursement shall be completed on the Portal and/or utilizing forms and instructions approved by CIMS. Prior to the initial request for reimbursement, Grantee must submit a schedule of values for payment to be approved by CIMS, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned, or delayed. Any changes to the schedule of values once approved will be processed and approved as task orders through the portal.
- 6.05 City agrees to provide Grantee written notice regarding any expenditure the City reasonably determines to be outside the permissible parameters of this Agreement. Said notice will provide Grantee thirty (30) days from receipt of said notice to cure the deficiency or refund to the City any sum of money paid by City to Grantee determined to:
  - (A) Have not been spent by Grantee strictly in accordance with the terms of this Agreement; or
  - (B) Not be supported by adequate documentation to fully justify the expenditure.
- 6.06 Unless CITY has questions concerning an expenditure by GRANTEE, CITY agrees to provide payment to GRANTEE within thirty (30) working days of receipt of completed invoice as defined above.
- 6.07 Upon termination of this Agreement, should any expense or charge be subsequently disallowed or disapproved using the same criteria as set out in Section 6 as a result of any auditing or monitoring by City, Grantee shall refund such amount to City within thirty (30) working days of City's written request therefore wherein the amount disallowed or disapproved shall be specified.

### VII. ALLOWABLE EXPENDITURES

- 7.01 Upon preparation of a construction plan and budget by Grantee, Grantee shall submit said budget to City for approval of any costs to be paid from funds received hereunder. Costs shall be considered allowable only if so approved in Grantee's construction budget, or otherwise approved in advance by City in writing, and incurred directly and specifically in the performance of and in compliance with this Agreement and with all city, state and federal laws; regulations and ordinances affecting Grantee's operations hereunder. Only the following categories of costs shall be considered allowable:
  - Acquisition contract for shade structures
  - Construction contract
  - Construction contingencies

• Costs of advertising for bids for construction of the project.

Expenditures of the funds provided under this Agreement shall only be allowed if incurred directly and specifically in the performance of and in compliance with this Agreement and all applicable city, state and federal laws, regulations and/or ordinances.

7.02 The following shall not be considered allowable costs under this Agreement:

- Personnel costs, salaries or wages paid directly by Grantee or other similarly affiliated organization
- Travel and travel-related expenses
- Costs or fees for consultant and/or professional services, except for those directly related to the projects
- Costs or fees associated with attendance at meetings, seminars, or conferences
- Costs or fees associated with regular maintenance and operation
- Fundraising
- Equipment and Furnishings, unless provided by Grantee's General Contractor and shown on the approved Plans
- Any advertising not authorized by subsection 7.01

7.03 Written requests for prior approval of expenditures outside of those listed in 7.01 shall be Grantee's responsibility and shall be made thirty (30) days from date necessary to permit a thorough review by City. Procurements and/or purchases which must be approved pursuant to the terms of this Agreement shall be conducted entirely in accordance with all applicable terms, provisions and requirements hereof.

### VIII. FURTHER REPRESENTATIONS, WARRANTIES AND COVENANTS

- 8.01 Grantee further represents and warrants that:
- (A) All information, data or reports heretofore or hereafter provided to City is, shall be, and shall remain complete and accurate as of the date shown on the information, data, or report, and that since said date shown, shall not have undergone any significant change without written notice to City.
- (B) It is financially stable and capable of fulfilling its obligations under this Agreement and that Grantee shall provide City immediate written notice of any adverse material change in the financial condition of Grantee that may materially and adversely effect its obligations hereunder.
- (C) No litigation or proceedings are presently pending or to Grantee's knowledge, threatened against Grantee.

(D) None of the provisions contained herein contravene or in any way conflict with the authority under which Grantee is doing business or with the provisions of any existing indenture or agreement of Grantee.

### IX. ACCESSIBILITY OF RECORDS

- 9.01 At any time and as often as City may deem necessary, upon seven (7) days written notice, Grantee shall make all of its records pertaining to this Agreement available to City or any of its authorized representatives, and shall permit City or any of its authorized representatives to audit, examine, and make excerpts and/or copies of same.
- 9.02 Grantee agrees and represents that it will cooperate with City, at no charge to the City, to satisfy, to the extent required by law, any and all requests for information received by City under the Texas Public Information Act or related laws pertaining to this Agreement.

### X. MONITORING AND EVALUATION

10.01 Grantee agrees that City may carry out reasonable monitoring and evaluation activities so as to ensure compliance by Grantee with this Agreement, and Grantee shall provide reasonable access to City related to such activities, and with all other laws, regulations and ordinances related to the performance hereof.

### XI. INDEMNITY

- 11.01 Grantee covenants and agrees to FULLY INDEMNIFY, DEFEND, and HOLD HARMLESS, the City and the elected officials, employees, officers, directors, volunteers and representatives of the City, individually and collectively, from and against any and all costs, claims, liens, damages, losses, expenses, fees, fines, penalties, proceedings, actions, demands, causes of action, liability and suits of any kind and nature, including but not limited to, personal or bodily injury, death and property damage, made upon the City directly or indirectly arising out of resulting from or related to Grantee's activities under this Agreement, including any acts or omissions of Grantee, any agent, officer, director, representative, employee, consultant or subcontractor of Grantee, and their respective officers, agents, employees, directors and representatives while in the exercise of performance of the rights or duties under this Agreement. The indemnity provided for in this paragraph shall not apply to any liability resulting from the negligence of City, its officers or employees, in instances where such negligence causes personal injury, death, or property damage. IN THE EVENT GRANTEE AND CITY ARE FOUND JOINTLY LIABLE BY A COURT OF COMPETENT JURISDICTION, LIABILITY SHALL BE APPORTIONED COMPARATIVELY IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS FOR THE STATE OF TEXAS, WITHOUT, HOWEVER, WAIVING ANY GOVRNMENTAL IMMUNITY AVAILABLE TO THE CITY UNDER TEXAS LAW AND WITHOUT WAIVING ANY DEFENSES OF THE PARTIES UNDER TEXAS LAW.
- 11.02 The provisions of this INDEMNITY are solely for the benefit of the parties hereto and not indented to create or grant any rights, contractual or otherwise, to any other person or entity. Grantee shall advise the City in writing within 24 hours of any claim or demand against

the City or Grantee known to Grantee related to or arising out of Grantee's activities under this Agreement and shall see to the investigation and defense of such claim or demand at Grantee's cost. The City shall have the right, at its option and at its own expense, to participate in such defense without relieving Grantee of any of its obligations under this paragraph.

### XII. INSURANCE

12.01 Prior to the commencement of any work under this Agreement, Grantee shall furnish copies of all required endorsements and an original completed Certificate(s) of Insurance to the City's Capital Improvements Management Services (CIMS) Department, which shall be clearly labeled, "Main Plaza Shade Structures" in the Description of Operations block of the Certificate. The original Certificate(s) shall be completed by an agent and signed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. The City will not accept Memorandum of Insurance or Binders as proof of insurance. The original certificate(s) or form must have the agent's original signature, including the signer's company affiliation, title and phone number, and be mailed, with copies of all applicable endorsements, directly from the insurer's authorized representative to the City. The City shall have no duty to pay or perform under this Agreement until such certificate and endorsements have been received and approved by the City's CIMS Department. No officer or employee, other than the City's Risk Manager, shall have authority to waive this requirement.

12.02 The City reserves the right to review the insurance requirements of this Article during the effective period of this Agreement and any extension or renewal hereof and to modify insurance coverages and their limits when deemed necessary and prudent by City's Risk Manager based upon changes in statutory law, court decisions, or circumstances surrounding this Agreement. In no instance will City allow modification whereupon City may incur increased risk.

12.03 GRANTEE's financial integrity is of interest to the City; therefore, subject to GRANTEE's right to maintain reasonable deductibles in such amounts as are approved by the City, GRANTEE shall obtain and maintain in full force and effect for the duration of this Agreement, and any extension hereof, at GRANTEE's sole expense, insurance coverage written on an occurrence basis, by companies authorized and admitted to do business in the State of Texas and with an A.M Best's rating of no less than A- (VII), in the following types and for an amount not less than the amount listed:

12.04 Grantee agrees to obtain all insurance coverages with minimum limits of not less than those limits delineated in Section 12.03 (Insurance table) from each vendor subcontracted by Grantee and provide a Certificate of Insurance and Endorsement that names the Grantee and the CITY as an additional insured.

12.05 The City shall be entitled, upon request and without expense, to receive copies of the policies, declaration page and all endorsements thereto as they apply to the limits required by the City, and may require the deletion, revision, or modification of particular policy terms, conditions, limitations or exclusions (except where policy provisions are established by law or regulation binding upon either of the parties hereto or the underwriter of any such policies). Consultant shall be required to comply with any such requests and shall submit a copy of the replacement certificate of insurance to City at the address provided below within 10 days of the requested change. GRANTEE shall pay any costs incurred resulting from said changes.

12.06 GRANTEE agrees that with respect to the above required insurance, all insurance policies are to contain or be endorsed to contain the following provisions:

- Name the City, its officers, officials, employees, volunteers, and elected representatives as additional insureds by endorsement, as respects operations and activities of, or on behalf of, the named insured performed under contract with the City, with the exception of the workers' compensation and professional liability polices;
- Provide for an endorsement that the "other insurance" clause shall not apply to the City of San Antonio where the City is an additional insured shown on the policy;
- Workers' compensation and employers' liability policies will provide a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City.

- Provide thirty (30) calendar days advance written notice directly to City of any suspension, cancellation, non-renewal or material change in coverage, and not less than ten (10) calendar days advance notice for nonpayment of premium.
- 12.07 Within five (5) calendar days of a suspension, cancellation or non-renewal of coverage, GRANTEE shall provide a replacement Certificate of Insurance and applicable endorsements to City. City shall have the option to suspend GRANTEE's performance should there be a lapse in coverage at any time during this contract. Failure to provide and to maintain the required insurance shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.
- 12.08 Nothing herein contained shall be construed as limiting in any way the extent to which GRANTEE may be held responsible for payments of damages to persons or property resulting from GRANTEE's or its subcontractors' performance of the work covered under this Agreement.
- 12.09 It is agreed that GRANTEE's insurance shall be deemed primary and non-contributory with respect to any insurance or self insurance carried by the City of San Antonio for liability arising out of operations under this Agreement.
- 12.10 It is understood and agreed that the insurance required is in addition to and separate from any other obligation contained in this Agreement.

### XIII. NONDISCRIMINATION

13.01 Grantee covenants that it, or agents, employees or anyone under its control, will not discriminate against any individual or group on account of race, color, sex, age, religion, national origin, handicap or familial status, in employment practices or in the use of or admission to the premises, which said discrimination Grantee acknowledges is prohibited.

### XIV. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- 14.01 Grantee covenants that neither it nor any member of its governing body or of its staff presently has any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of services required to be performed under this Agreement. Grantee further covenants that in the performance of this Agreement, no persons having such interest shall be employed or appointed as a member of its governing body or of its staff.
- 14.02 Grantee covenants and agrees that no member of its governing body or of its staff, or any of their family members to within the 2<sup>nd</sup> degree of consanguinity or affinity shall possess any interest in the City funds provided under this contract. Grantee further covenants and agrees that under this contract it will fully comply with all federal, state and local statutes, codes and policies regulating, prohibiting or relating to conflicts of interest.
- 14.03 No member of City's governing body or of its staff who exercises any function or responsibility in the review or approval of the undertaking or carrying out of this Agreement shall:

- (A) Participate in any decision relating to this Agreement which may affect his or her personal interest or the interest of any corporation, partnership, or association in which he or she has a direct or indirect interest;
- (B) Have any direct or indirect interest in this Agreement or the proceeds thereof.

### XV. POLITICAL ACTIVITY

15.01 None of the activities performed hereunder shall involve, and no portion of the funds received hereunder shall be used, either directly or indirectly, for any political activity including, but not limited to, an activity to further the election or defeat of any candidate for public office or for any activity undertaken to influence the passage, defeat or final content of local, state or federal legislation.

### XVI. RIGHTS TO PROPOSAL AND CONTRACTUAL MATERIAL

16.01 All finished or unfinished reports, documents, data, studies, surveys, charts, drawings, maps, models, photographs, designs, plans, schedules, or other appended documentation to any proposal or contract, and any responses, inquiries, correspondence and related material submitted by Grantee, shall, upon receipt, become the property of City.

### XVII. CONTRACTING

- 17.01 Any work or services contracted hereunder shall be contracted only by written contract or agreement and, unless specific waiver is granted in writing by City, shall be subject by its terms to each and every provision of this Agreement. Compliance by contractors with this Agreement shall be the responsibility of Grantee. Grantee is responsible to ensure that all local, state and federal permits and approvals required for the activities under this Agreement are obtained.
- 17.02 City shall in no event be obligated to any third party, including any sub-contractor of Grantee, for performance of or payment for work or services.

### XVIII. CHANGES AND AMENDMENTS

- 18.01 Except when the terms of this Agreement expressly provide otherwise, any alterations, additions, or deletions to the terms hereof shall only be by amendment in writing executed by both City and Grantee under authority granted by formal action of the Parties' respective governing bodies.
- 18.02 It is understood and agreed by the Parties hereto that changes in local, state and federal rules, regulations or laws applicable hereto may occur during the term of this Agreement and that any such changes shall be automatically incorporated into this Agreement without written amendment hereto, and shall become a part hereof as of the effective date of the rule, regulation or law.

### XIX. ASSIGNMENTS

19.01 Grantee shall not transfer, pledge or otherwise assign this Agreement, any interest in and to same, or any claim arising thereunder, without first procuring the written approval of City. Any attempt at transfer, pledge or other assignment shall be void *ab initio* and shall confer no rights upon any third person.

### XX. SEVERABILITY OF PROVISIONS

20.01 If any clause or provision of this Agreement is held invalid, illegal or unenforceable under present or future federal, state or local laws, including but not limited to the City Charter, City Code, or ordinances of the City of San Antonio, Texas, then and in that event it is the intention of the Parties hereto that such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other clause or provision hereof and that the remainder of this Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable clause or provision was never contained herein; it is also the intention of the Parties hereto that in lieu of each clause or provision of this Agreement that is invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, there be added as a part of the Agreement a clause or provision as similar in terms to such invalid, illegal or unenforceable clause or provision as may be possible, legal, valid and enforceable.

### XXI. NON-WAIVER OF PERFORMANCE

- 21.01 No waiver by either Party of a breach of any of the terms, conditions, covenants or guarantees of this Agreement shall be construed or held to be a waiver of any succeeding or preceding breach of the same or any other term, condition, covenant or guarantee herein contained. Further, any failure of either Party to insist in any one or more cases upon the strict performance of any of the covenants of this Agreement, or to exercise any option herein contained, shall in no event be construed as a waiver or relinquishment for the future of such covenant or option. In fact, no waiver, change, modification or discharge by either Party hereto of any provision of this Agreement shall be deemed to have been made or shall be effective unless expressed in writing and signed by the Party to be charged.
- 21.02 No act or omission of either Party shall in any manner impair or prejudice any right, power, privilege, or remedy available to either Party hereunder or by law or in equity, such rights, powers, privileges, or remedies to be always specifically preserved hereby.
- 21.03 No representative or agent of City may waive the effect of the provisions of this Article without formal action from the City Council.

### XXII. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

22.01 This Agreement constitutes the final and entire agreement between the Parties hereto and contains all of the terms and conditions agreed upon. No other agreements, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this Agreement shall be deemed to exist or to bind the

Parties hereto unless same be in writing, dated subsequent to the date hereof and duly executed by the Parties.

### XXIII, NOTICES

23.01 For purposes of this Agreement, all official communications and notices among the Parties shall be deemed sufficient if in writing and mailed, registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, to the addresses set forth below:

### XXIV. PARTIES BOUND

24.01 This Agreement shall be binding on and inure to the benefit of the Parties hereto and their respective heirs, executors, administrators, legal representatives, successors and assigns, except as otherwise expressly provided herein.

### XXV. RELATIONSHIP OF PARTIES

25.01 Nothing contained herein shall be deemed or construed by the Parties hereto, or by any third party, as creating the relationship of principal and agent, partners, joint venturers or any other similar such relationship between the Parties hereto.

### XXVI. TEXAS LAW TO APPLY

26.01 This Agreement shall be construed under and in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas, and all obligations of the Parties created hereunder are performable in Bexar County, Texas.

### XXVII. GENDER

27.01 Words of any gender used in this Agreement shall be held and construed to include any other gender, and words in the singular number shall be held to include the plural, unless the context otherwise requires.



Established in 1731 as the Villa de San Fernando by Spanish settlers of the Canary Islands, Main Plaza has always been at the center of San Antonio's municipal government. Being lauded as the Heart of the City, plans were announced today for the Main Plaza opening day celebration, scheduled for Sunday, April 13.

Last year, Mayor Phil Hardberger led efforts to revitalize the plaza and transform it into a gathering place to celebrate the city's historic past while incorporating modern elements to be enjoyed by locals and visitors alike.

"This plaza is truly the heart of our city," Mayor Hardberger said. "This restoration will transform what had become an afterthought in the middle of a busy city into a peaceful, relaxing oasis where today's generations can pay tribute to our past."

Festivities will kick off with a mariachi mass celebrated by Archbishop José H. Gomez at San Fernando Cathedral at 5:00 p.m. The community will then be invited to enjoy the new Main Plaza grounds with activities ranging from live musical entertainment to children's activities. 

They disliked the two metal kiosks, however, while others wondered about the expanses of loose crushed granite.



### Main Plaza's big opening April 13

It doesn't look like much now, with bulldozers still on site.

But the Main Plaza is set to open in two short months.

If its renovation is successful, the historic plaza - where San Antonio will become a place where locals will be drawn to festivals, rallies and performances.

Father David Garcia, former rector of San Fernando Cathedral, and Mayor Phil Hardberger, spearheaded the project. The organization that will build on this foundation, however, is the Main Plaza Conservancy.

Under the leadership of executive director Jane Pauley Flores and programming coordinator Marisela Barrera, the nonprofit organization is charged with making the plaza a dynamic public space.

For Barrera, that means getting gente to come and come again.

While the area's origins are spiritual, governmental and military, its biggest draw besides the cathedral may turn out to be its fountains.

The plaza will feature "five interactive dancing fountains. That's what I'm calling them," Barrera says.

When those spaces aren't wet, with water shooting up from ground level, they'll be performance spaces.

"It's a fantastic anchor, a historical and spiritual center," but Main Plaza's facelift offers "a great opportunity to bring more activity to downtown," says Barrera, an arts administrator, grant writer and

April 13's grand opening will begin with a Mariachi Mass celebrated by Archbishop José Gomez and Garcia. Barrera says the San Antonio Symphony will perform, as will other diverse musical groups. Various community and cultural organizations are being lined up tol provide family activities. Much is still being planned.

Ultimately, Main Plaza will be a place for rallies and festivals, she says. A few are already lined up, including the Founders Day Festival and a campaign called Walk and Roll to Work.

Renovations will make the plaza more user-friendly. Electricity will be a lot easier to access, and free WiFi will be available, she says. Two permanent vendors have yet to be selected for the site.

Main Plaza Conservancy officials are meeting with the Academy of Tejano Artists & Musicians, headed by David Lee Garza, several conjunto organizations and jazz groups.

"There are a lot of possibilities," including bringing an old-fashioned carpa, or tent, show to Main Plaza, she says. Garcia envisions a Farmers Market.

"It could be a quiet space sometimes," she says, "other days bursting with activity.'



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

The new Main Plaza is just part of a much larger plan.

It's a plan to make San Antonio a real city:

- A city with history and heritage.
- · A city where people work, play and live downtown.
- A city with a center.

Main Plaza is a piece of the puzzle that can make us a real city, in a future world that will treasure real cities with diversity, with life. Cities alive with people.

Even without AT&T, downtown's got strong business and medical communities. We're blessed with the River Walk and its tourist and convention business. We've got a branch of a major state university.

Downtown is the seat of city, county and federal governments. Neighborhoods around downtown are revitalizing and even gentrifying.

So, why doesn't downtown make it as the center of a real city? It's basic: We need more people living downtown.

For years there have been about 3,500 downtown residents. More are coming, but we'll just begin to be a real city when there are 35,000.

It's really about what kind of city we want in the future. Twenty years from now? (1988 was 20 years ago!) What about 50 or 100 years from now?

Do we want a downtown with more or fewer people, more or fewer cars? Do we want a city with street life, not more parking lots; a city that walks and strolls; a city that breathes life; a city where you can live and breathe.

Imagine San Antonio in 2080: a real city, thriving around a vital Main Plaza, a gift from the citizens from 2008.

So, what about Main Plaza now? What do you expect? And when do you want it?

It was supposed to open it April, and it did, but the Plaza wasn't done for several more months, and the county's side won't be done for months, yet. Still a work in progress.

Is it the rival of plazas and plazzas in the real cities of the world? Of course not. There are design criticisms and there are design problems. Time will heal.

Architects design the space, and engineers build it, but it's people, and the way they use it, that can make it a real plaza. In the heart of a real city.

Was it expensive? Was it worth it? Time will tell.

### September 30, 2008 Main Plaza tree removal almost complete

### This was first reported last week in the Express-News.

This morning, Tree Wise Men started removing the last two of the diseased red oaks from Main Plaza. They're supposed to be done by the end of today.

Paula Stallcup, director of downtown operations, said a total of five red oaks will be removed from Main Plaza. (There were two in August.)



There are four on the northern end of the plaza, which will be replaced with two trees. The one red oak on the south end will be replaced, too. Stallcup said the city forester is still deciding on which species of tree to

replace the diseased trees with. They will wait until the end of October to plant the three new trees.

The city will erect umbrellas throughout the plaza to help with the lack of shade. Local artist **Peter Zubiate**, who has a studio and gallery space downtown on Broadway just before it hits Houston Street, was there this morning observing the cutting. He said the city approached him about recycling some of the larger pieces of tree into furniture for the plaza.

In a related note, it looks like the construction around the Bexar County Courthouse will be done by Dec. 7. That's the date the city has slated for a ceremony for the completion of that part of the plaza renovation.

In even another related note, the construction being done to the facade of the next door Bexar County Justice Center is not related to the Main Plaza-area construction. That said, some may notice the Justice Center has a new roof.





# Main Plaza rounding into form

Lately, Main Plaza has settled into a kind of problematic-free groove, with more positives to report than negatives.

About a month ago — in response to a guest column in the Express-News by Henry Trevino - I railed against the snafu that had been the renovation process of Main Plaza.

The Heart of San Antonio had seen one disappointing revelation after another — the shoddy fountains, the dying trees, the lack of compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act - since its opening ceremony almost a year to date.

I walked Main Plaza several times in March and found many of the most glaring problems had been fixed. This was first reported in an Express-News article Nov. 25, which exposed the plaza's lack of compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The city was pulling \$250,000 from its capitol improvements program to bring Main Plaza up to ADA standards, and to correct other obvious shortcomings.

The plaza is now in accordance with the ADA, according to Razi Hosseini, assistant city engineer with the city.

Hosseini said the main obstacle was the lack of hand railing on the steps on the east side of the plaza. That was completed late last year, Hosseini said.

Other improvements were like icing on the cake, meaning they weren't ADA requirements, but still improved the plaza.



The truncated dome surface, which help legally blind people tell where sidewalk ends and street begins, will be expanded in two key areas of the Dolorosa Street sidewalk.



There is now a pathway connecting plaza steps to the sidewalk (above), near Main and Commerce streets. Before, those steps lead into shrubbery.

Paths made of rectangular, textured flagstone were widened throughout the plaza.


The crushed granite, which many wheelchair users have complained is tough to navigate through, will be replaced in two months with something more compact. The labor-intensive task of replacing the granite will take place in two months because they don't want to interrupt several upcoming activities like Fiesta-related concerts and Main Plaza's one-year anniversary of its opening ceremony.



As reported in the Express-News last week, canopies will go up soon to help replace some of the shade the plaza lost when seven decaying trees were removed. Those have been replaced by infantile Mexican Sycamore and Cedar.

Five canopies will be paid for with funds raised by the Main Plaza Conservancy, the nonprofit that runs the plaza. Eduardo Garcia, project manager with the conservancy, told Express-News reporter Scott Huddleston the group has so far raised \$250,000 for the "shade structures."

The city has budgeted up to \$100,000 for the borings and other foundation work, Huddleston said. Read the full story here.





The Historic and Design Review Commission, which approved the canopies last week, is still debating the colors. The renderings, done by Rios Clementi Hale Studios, show red and orange structures, with an occasional strip of light green. Some commissioners with the HDRC said those colors seemed too gaudy for the historic plaza, the Express-News reported.

Some commissioners are concerned that bright colors would detract from surrounding buildings. They said they'd like to see other color schemes that blend with nature, such as green, sky blue or even white — which might turn dingy from airborne dirt, but would at least camouflage the eventual grackle droppings.

It's all part of a flurry of activity aimed at getting the plaza ready for spring events and activities, including an April 19 concert

featuring accordion legends Flaco Jimenez and Esteban Jordan. It would be a similar to a roundabout but it would make a larger portion of the "heart of the city" walkable and accesible. Statue of city's namesake is heading for Main Plaza

Moving San Antonio de Padua is the result of a street expansion and a fountain restoration.

He's the patron saint of finding things, so it seems appropriate that the statue of San Antonio de Padua will move to a central, more visible spot, in Main Plaza.

Members of the Historic and Design Review Commission approved relocation of the statue honoring the city's namesake, but not without voicing frustration that the move wasn't part of the original plan to renovate the historic plaza.

"It's like we're just sticking it there," Commissioner Eva Esquivel said Wednesday.

Esquivel opposed the move, which she said "diminishes the integrity of the statue and the plaza," because the work, made of white Italian marble, will be placed amid linear water fountains and other modern design features.

"Shooting water next to St. Anthony? I don't know about that," Esquivel said.

# STATUE RELOCATION

Plans are in the works to move a 1955 statue of San Antonio de Padua, the city's namesake and patron saint, from the north end of the Bexar County Courthouse to a spot by the fountains in Main Plaza.



Other commissioners said there was no other place to put the statue, which has long stood near the northeast corner of the Bexar County Courthouse. Because a portion of Dwyer Avenue was permanently closed for

the plaza project, the street has to be widened where it meets Dolorosa Street, to allow for adequate right turns.

And because the county plans to restore a 19th-century Lady Justice fountain and put it by the courthouse, there wasn't enough room left for St. Anthony without crowding him by the fountain, James Le-Flore, the city's public art program director, told the commission.

"This is really the only location that would work," said Commissioner Victor Salas, who helped the city select the new spot.


The statue's move is the latest surprise in the plaza project, originally budgeted at \$10 million and now running about \$17.7 million. Local government entities have allocated about \$13 million, and \$4.7 million has come from private donors.

The county will pay for relocation of the statue, expected to run about \$5,000.

Lupe Rodriguez, whose uncle designed the statue more than 50 years ago, will do much of the hands-on work. He owns Rodriguez Bros. Mēmorial, cofounded in 1920 by his uncle, Texas artist Louis Rodriguez, who found the Carrera marble for the life-size work.

The statue, donated 'to the city in 1955 by the Order of Alhambra, was taken down Tuesday and is standing behind a fence west of the courthouse along Main Avenue. It will be cleaned after it's placed in a few weeks at its new location, on a granite boulder that serves as its base and surrounded by landscaping, said Lupe Rodriguez, whose uncle died in 1985.

He said he's happy that his uncle's work, depicting St. An-

thony holding a spray of lilies and a Bible, will be in the heart of the plaza. The work, sculpted by Tavralle Varsante and unknown Italian artisans and made of marble from a village near Pisa, is a jewel, he said.

"It was hiding away from the public," Rodriguez said. "I think it's going to be seen a lot easier. I feel proud of it, and I'm glad they're doing something about it."

St. Anthony, born in 1195, preached to the masses in Italy, southern France, Spain and Portugal. He died June 13, 1231.

The city is believed to have first been named in 1691, after Spanish explorers first saw indigenous people here near San Pedro Springs on June 13, the feast day of St. Anthony.

This year, García, owner of Los Valles Produce on the Southwest Side, said he'll pass. The main reason he said he's opting out is because the demonstrations haven't done much.

I think it had great impact that day," said García, who entered the country illegally from Mexico three decades ago as a teen but now is a legal permanent resident. "But it didn't do much in the long run."

Acknowledging that many immigrant supporters in San Antonio think like García — and recognizing

that the ongoing U.S. crackdown on Alamo and end with another rally illegal immigration has driven some potential participants underground activists are still planning a third march for May 1, observed internationally as Workers' Day.

The main organizer is the Southwest Workers Union, which is trying to drum up last-minute support from other advocacy groups.

Ché López, the union's co-director, said people will gather at noon Thursday at Milam Park, with a rally kicking off at 5 p.m. About an hour later, the march will go through downtown to a stop at the

López said he did not know how many people will show up, but he hoped for as many as last year between 2,000 and 3,000.

That count was much lower than San Antonio's first Workers' Day immigration march in 2006, which drew about 18,000. Other cities that year produced massive turnouts at similar events, including an estimated 500,000 in Los Angeles, which led to a shut-down of much of that



Auxiliary bishop helps with torch relay that calls attention to immigration problems.

As dusk fell on Main Plaza, a caravan of honking trucks and weary runners brought the torch some of them had carried from Mexico City to its final stop for the night.

A group of colorful dancers performed in front of San Fernando Cathedral to welcome the runners, including Auxiliary Bishop Oscar Cantú, who carried the torch for the final two-mile leg to the cathedral.

After a celebratory Mass to welcome the members of the Carrera Antorcha Guadalupana and the Tepevac Association to San Antonio, the organizations hoped to educate attendees about the need for immigration reform in the United States.

"(The relay is to) call attention to the reality of the hundreds of thousands of immigrants coming across the border each year," Cantú said. "I think everyone agrees that the laws that we have are not serving us well."

The relay began at the Basilica de Guadalupe in Mexico City on Oct. 5 and will end at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City on Dec. 12, the Catholic feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

Despite delays due to a shortage of runners and high winds during Wednesday's journey from Beeville, participants were in high spirits once they rolled into Main Plaza for the evening's festivi-

Today, the torch will travel to Gonzales on its way toward

"I do it for everybody with no papers," said Cristina Robinson-Gasso, who drove a truck flanked with giant portraits of La Virgen de Guadalupe and St. Juan Diego, the young Mexican to whom the Virgin is said to have appeared in December 1531.

The relay's goal is to call attention to the dignity of all

people and add a human face to immigration debate, Robinson-Gasso said.

"I feel it in my heart," she said. "It's very hard when its you, your own family."

The first relay was solely within New York City, but at the urging of Cardinal Edward Egan, the group made the relay international in 2001.

Some run the whole distance while others participate for short jaunts as the caravan passes through their area, said Robinson-Gasso, who will travel with the group to Hous-

As the youngest bishop in the country, Cantú said he felt obligated to at least take the torch for part of its trip through San Antonio.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has been calling for immigration reform that respects the dignity of immigrants coming across the country's borders, Cantú said.

'(The torch) is a way to emphasize the dignity of every human being," Cantú said, adding that the country needs an immigration system that keeps families together, allows immigrants to enter the country legally to work and also protects the nation's borders.



# Kids learn Day of the Dead blends solemn

Writing little poems making fun of the living proves right up youngsters' alley.

Miranda Williamson, age 10, sat silently hunched over a blank piece of paper, trying to summon her inner voice and contemplating the lighter side of death.

Her task: to write a rhyming, satirical poem, called a *calavera*, which pokes fun at the living as part of the traditional Day of the Dead celebrations.

After considerable thought, she made this lyrical offering:

"My sister has curly hair. So she flew up into the air. When she came down she hit the ground. When she fell she hit her head. When she hit her head she fell down dead."

It might seem like a morbid way for a fourth-grader to spend an afternoon. But for Williamson and about a dozen more children and their parents who attended a poetry workshop Sunday at the Museo Alameda, it was just the opposite — a way to set aside some of the menace of death.

"When we celebrate Day of the Dead, we like to think some-

times that death can be a happy experience," Mia Lopez, the museum's program coordinator, explained to the group. "That's what a *calavera* does. These poems are a way that we can laugh at ourselves and other people."

Among a long lineup of Day of the Dead events at Market Square, the workshop highlighted one of the holiday's lesser-known rituals. Like many of the more recognized symbols — or-

ange marigolds, elaborate altars and brightly colored sugar skulls — the poems blend the solemn with the festive.

The epitaphs originated in Spain about 500 years ago as a way of lampooning the elite. A section of the "El Corazon de Memoria" community altar for Day of the Dead by artist David Zamora Casas — on display in Main Plaza through Saturday.



# CREATIVE HANDS AND SANDS

Folk art tapestry near San Fernando Cathedral won't be here long

orking under a large white tent in Main Plaza, a team of artisans from the Canary Islands is busy creating an alfombra, or tapestry, out of more than 300 pounds of naturally colored volcanic sand.

The exquisitely detailed piece, p.m. Sunday. which spans the width of San Fernando Cathedral, will be unveiled at 10 a.m. Saturday, then destroyed during a ceremonial procession led by Archbishop José Gomez at 3

"This is an ephemeral art," said Alfonso Chiscano, president of the Friends of the Canary Islands Association, "It's like our human life you are born, you grow up and then you die."

Seven artisans began working on the alfombra last week. First they outlined the design in chalk on the



paving stones in front of the cathedral. Then they began the painstaking process of applying the sand by hand. The design includes images of Our Lady of Guadalupe and Our Lady of Candelaria, patron saint of the Spanish islands.

Half of the alfombra is dedicated to San Antonio, and half is dedicated to the Canary Islands, said Domingo Gonzalez, director of the group from La Orotava in Tenerife, Canary Islands

Alfombras are a folk art tradition in the Canary Islands dating back more than 150 years. The tapestries are created out of sand and/or flower petals for the Catholic feast of Corpus Christi.

Three years ago, artisans were invited to San Antonio to create an alfombra for the 275th anniversary of the arrival of the Canary Islanders to the area. The Spanish colonists founded San Fernando Cathedral and established San Antonio's first civil government. At 11 a.m. Sunday at Main Plaza, there will be a dramatic re-enactment of the Canary Islanders' arrival.

Chiscano, a native of the Canary Islands, said he would like to see the creation of the alfombra become an annual event in San Antonio.

Father Tony Vilano, rector of the cathedral, planned to photograph the progress of the tapes-

"I'm just in shock of how beautiful it is right now," he said.

The folk art tapestry is made of volcanic sand from Spain. Artisans from the Canary Islands created the work, and it spans the width of nearby San Fernando Cathedral, which the colonists founded. They also established San Antonio's first civil government.





Where in Jordan's set, just a few people stood in front of the stage (if any at some points), there were dozens when Jimenez simply appeared on stage, with camera in hand. After 10 or 15 minutes after Jimenez started, the place was standing room only.
