A RESOLUTION NO. 86-58-67

ENDORSING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A 9-1-1 EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION DISTRICT AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO TO BECOME A PARTICIPATING JURISDICTION OF THE BEXAR METRO 9-1-1 NETWORK.

WHEREAS, the Alamo Area Council of Governments 9-1-1 Management Committee has agreed to pursue establishment of the Bexar Metro 9-1-1 Network; and

WHEREAS, the Bexar Metro 9-1-1 Network has called an election on January 17, 1987 to approve the establishment of a 9-1-1 Emergency Communication District; and

WHEREAS, the proposed system would enhance the current 9-1-1 system through identification of the address of a calling telephone number allowing for accurate dispatch and assistance when caller is unable to verbally communicate or is uncertain of location; and

WHEREAS, the addition of selective routing of calls to 9-1-1 answering points will vastly improve speed and accuracy of calls arriving at the correct dispatch point and remove confusion over from which geographic entity the call originates; and

WHEREAS, proposed legislation to be considered during the State Legislative Session would mandate statewide service for areas that have not approved a 9-1-1 Emergency Communication District thereby removing local control of the operation and financing of the system; NOW THEREFORE:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAN ANTONIO:

That the City of San Antonio endorses the 9-1-1 Emergency Communication System and encourage voters to approve the Bexar Metro 9-1-1 Network.

SECTION 2. That the City of San Antonio shall become a participating jurisdiction of the Bexar Metro 9-11 Emergency Network upon approval of the District by the voters and pursuant to the provision of the Emergency Telephone Number Act.

SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATION

The Bexar Metro 9-1-1 Network (formerly the AACOG 9-1-1 Management Committee) has called an election on January 17, 1987 for the establishment of a 9-1-1 Emergency Communication District. The proposed resolution endorses the establishment of the district and authorizes the City of San Antonio to become a participating jurisdiction of the Bexar Metro 9-1-1 Network. It is recommended that the City Council approve the resolution.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Bexar Metro 9-1-1 Network will result in the establishment of an enhanced emergency communication system. The attached fact sheet outlines the major differences between the current system and the system being proposed to the voters on January 17.

In addition to the enhancements, the State Legislature will consider legislation to implement a mandatory statewide 9-1-1 system. Jurisdictions which have approved a system prior to the date specified in the proposed legislation (to be determined, but after January 17 date), will be grandfathered. It is estimated that the cost per user for the state-wide system will be greater than that being proposed for the Bexar Metro 9-1-1 Network. Additionally, it is preferable to maintain local control for the system and associated costs.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The costs for the election will be paid by the Bexar Metro 9-1-1 Network if the system is approved by the voters. If the proposition fails, each jurisdiction in Bexar County will pay the incremental costs of adding the issue to the January ballot on a per capita basis. The issue is being added to the San Antonio River Authority and Edwards Underground Water District elections scheduled on that date.
